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I Find It Recorded in My Notebook . . .

The February meeting of the Hansom Wheels was held at The Palmetto Club on the 20th with eighteen in attendance: George and Sarah Linder, Kevin and Becky Lewis, Julie Smoak, Wayne Scott, Ashby and Joann Morton, Richard Blenko, Jamie McCulloch, Tom Elmore, Pat McNeely, Joyce Crout, Kelly Weber, Monte Steedley, Joe Long, Mary Dematteis, and me, Phil Dematteis, aka The Tantalus.

After dinner, I announced that the game was afoot; we toasted *the* woman, Irene Adler; and **Kelly Weber** led us in the responsive reading of The Musgrave Ritual.

Next up were the Happy Hour Posers, in which the goal is to dope out the titles of Holmes adventures from dopey clues in the form of puns: 1. Several British country-estate owners stood around at the entrance to the property of one of them cracking clever and grimly humorous jokes = the wry gate squires = "The Reigate Squires." 2. I had a dream in which a nasty, pus-filled sore on my foot could talk and told me how sad it felt = "The Blue Carbuncle." 3. If the doctor played on TV by Hugh Laurie (and based on Sherlock Holmes) had a brother whose first and middle names were Matthew Thomas, that guy would be ... = M. T. House = "The Empty House" (the Assigned Story of the evening). 4. The tech guy from Best Buy came to my house and explained to me the meanings of the keys on my computer = the Geek interpreter = "The Greek Interpreter."

After the groans from the audience had subsided, it was time for the Featured Presentation of the evening: **Joe Long**'s disquisition on the martial art of Bartitsu, which, Holmes tells Watson—after reappearing in 1894 from his three-year absence, during which he was thought to be dead—he employed to sidestep Professor Moriarty's attempt to throw him into the Reichenbach Falls and send the evil professor into the abyss instead. In relating this conversation to the reader in "The Adventure of the Empty House," Watson lowercases the name of the technique (which is incorrect, because it is based on the name of its inventor, Edward William <u>Bart</u>on-Wright) and misspells it by leaving out the first "t," resulting in "baritsu." Sometimes I think Watson really was as dumb as he was portrayed by Nigel Bruce in the old Basil Rathbone movies.

Anyway, Joe gave an excellent talk. It was, however, marred a bit at the outset when he repeated the old canard about Arthur Conan Doyle "killing Holmes off" in "The Final Problem" in 1893 and "bringing him back to life" in "The Empty House" in 1903. But we forgave him, because, although Joe is an expert on many subjects, he is not a Sherlockian, and therefore he doesn't know that Holmes was a real person, the stories are true and were written by Watson (except for two by Holmes himself and two by an anonymous third-person author), and Doyle was merely Watson's literary agent. Everything was fine after that, as he explained that Barton-Wright, who had lived in Japan for several years, combined aspects of boxing, jujitsu, judo, cane fighting, and French kickboxing (savate) to create Bartitsu in the late 1890s. He noted that it was a perfect form of self-defense for a rational thinker such as Holmes because it allows one to systematically defend oneself by using an assailant's own strength and movements against him. Joe had an umbrella from which he pulled out the shaft, which then formed a cane (I wondered whether there was a sword concealed inside the cane, but if so, it was never revealed) and showed us a few ways to use it to defend against an adversary by hitting him on the head or sticking it between his legs and tripping him up. We ended, as always, with a group reading of Vincent Starrett's Sacred Sonnet, "221B," and went home to practice what we had seen. Unfortunately, our umbrellas don't have detachable shafts, like Joe's, so we wrecked them, and now we get wet whenever we go out in the rain.
