## I Find It Recorded in My Notebook . . .

The 2024 Hansom Wheels Christmas Party was held at The Palmetto Club on December 5 with twenty-three members and guests in attendance: George and Sarah Linder, Kevin and Becky Lewis, Julie Smoak, Wayne Scott, Carl and Elaine Johnson, Myrtle Robinson, Robert and Will Cranford, Mark McGill, Ashby and Joann Morton, Richard Blenko, Jamie McCulloch, Austin Keefer, Pat and Allison McNeely, Joyce Crout, Nadia Eileen Mostafa, Mary Dematteis, and me, Phil Dematteis, aka The Tantalus.

After dinner, I announced that the game was afoot; we toasted *the* woman, Irene Adler; and we did the responsive reading of The Musgrave Ritual.

As a bit of Christmas music played over the PA system, courtesy of **George Linder's** laptop, the Hansom Players got into their costumes and gathered up the props for the Christmas play: *The Lauriston Gardens Mystery*, by **Bob Robinson**, adapted from the London portions of *A Study in Scarlet*, by John H. Watson (the Utah portions are by an anonymous author; possibly Watson's literary agent, that guy Doyle). The cast, in order of appearance, comprised **Phil Dematteis** as Sherlock Holmes, **Richard Blenko** as Dr. John H. Watson, **Robert Cranford** as Commissionaire Peterson, **George Linder** as Inspector Tobias Gregson, **Carl Johnson** as Inspector G. Lestrade,

Will Cranford as Enoch J. Drebber (deceased), Robert Cranford again as Constable John Rance, Elaine Johnson as Jefferson Hope's confederate "Mrs. Sawyer," Will Cranford again as street urchin/Baker Street Irregular Wiggins, and Wayne Scott as Jefferson Hope. It was directed by Allison McNeely, who did all she could to whip us into shape during the rehearsals—actually, *rehearsal* singular, since we only had one. Richard Blenko, who couldn't make it down from his home in West Virginia in time, didn't even have *that* and was practically cold-reading the script, but you wouldn't know it from his performance.

The penultimate event of the evening was the drawing for door prizes, which we had postponed until this point to make sure everybody stayed through the play. As has been the case for the last several years, these were supplied by **Richard Blenko**, who always goes all out to provide basketsful of sumptuous gifts, including books, food, knickknacks, and God knows what all. And there were no losers, because he brought enough for everybody!

We ended, as always, with a group reading of Vincent Starrett's Sacred Sonnet, "221B," and went home to sit up and await the arrival of jolly old Saint Nick, who, unfortunately, wouldn't get there for another nineteen days.

Exactly two weeks after the Christmas Party—on December 19, 2024—we lost one of our longtime members with the death of **Bernard Manning** at the age of ninety-nine. **Bernard** (pronounced "BER-nerd," like George Bernard Shaw) had an aristocratic demeanor but a good sense of humor and was always ready to join the other actors embarrassing ourselves in the Christmas plays. In fact, I looked back at old *Pink 'Uns*, starting with issue number 1 (June 1977), and the first mention I found of **Bernard** (which doesn't mean that he wasn't also present at earlier meetings) was when he acted in *The Devil's Foot* at the 1981 Christmas Party. He and his late wife, **Betty**, were mainstays of our group for many years, and we miss both of them. Our condolences to their daughter, **Elizabeth**, and the rest of their family.


